we celebrate Queen Elizabeth's Platinum Jubilee. It's a once

in a life time event as it's highly unlikely that any of us will be celebrating another platinum jubilee in our lifetimes. What a remarkable achievement - 70 years of service.

The celebrations in church actually started in May with a Platinum Jubilee concert where we had the real pleasure of listening to some of the music played at the Coronation Service in Westminster Abbey back on the 2nd June 1953.

The service opened with the stirring music by Charles Parry and the words 'I was glad when they said unto me'. With these opening words a young 27 year old woman took her first step down the aisle of Westminster Abbey and walked into the history books.

When I heard the opening notes played in church I felt the enormity of the occasion and also something of the weight of responsibility that a young woman was committing herself to.

The Chinese philosopher Lao-tzu (604-531 BC) once said, "A journey of a thousand miles begins with a single step". A reign of 70 years began with that first step into a new and unknown future.

> It's during the baptism service that a person is anointed with oil blessed by the Bishop of Chester. And it was in the Coronation Service that Princess Elizabeth was anointed with oil by the Archbishop of Canterbury.

> This moment was so sacred that television cameras weren't allowed to broadcast that moment in the service. Anointing with oil is an important symbol in both services as an outward sign that we are called by God into a life of service to others.

> But life is more of a pilgrimage than a journey as it's not the arriving that's important but the journey itself.

> As you journey through life, choose your destinations well but do not hurry there.

You will arrive soon enough.

Wander the back roads and forgotten paths, keeping your destination in your heart, like a fixed point of a compass.

Seek out new voices, strange sights, and ideas foreign to your own.

Such things are riches for the soul.

And if, upon arrival you find that your destination is not exactly as you dreamed. do not be disappointed.

Think of all you would have missed but for the journey there, and know that the true worth of your travels lies not in the journey's end, but in whom you come to be along the way.

On her twenty-first birthday, 21 April 1947, Princess Elizabeth was with her parents and younger sister on a tour of South Africa. In a speech broadcast on the radio from Cape Town, the Princess dedicated her life to the service of



the Commonwealth. The following is an excerpt

from her famous speech showing her great love for the Commonwealth.

"It is for us, who have grown up in these years of danger and glory, to see that it is accomplished in the long years of peace that we all hope stretch ahead.

If we all go forward together with an unwavering faith, a high courage, and a quiet heart, we shall be able to make of this ancient commonwealth, which we all love so dearly, an even grander thing - more free, more prosperous, more happy and a more powerful influence for good in the world - than it has been in the greatest days of our forefathers.

To accomplish that we must give nothing less than the whole of ourselves. There is a motto which has been borne by many of my ancestors - a noble motto, "I serve". Those words were an inspiration to many bygone heirs to the Throne when they made their knightly dedication as they came to manhood. I cannot do quite as they did. But through the inventions of science I can do what was not possible for any of them. I can make my solemn act of dedication with everyone in the Commonwealth listening. I should like to make that dedication now. It is very simple.

I declare before you all that my whole life, whether it be long or short, shall be devoted to your service and the service of our great family to which we all belong. But I shall not have strength to carry out this resolution alone unless you join in it with me, as I now invite you to do: I know that your support will be unfailingly given. God help me to make good my vow, and God bless all of you who are willing to share in it."

Up and down the country, the people of Britain are celebrating the first Platinum Jubilee of a British monarch to ever take place! Therefore, on Saturday 14th May, Mellor Church Choir held a once in a lifetime concert dedicated to Queen Elizabeth II.

It was a beautiful, sunny evening and the concert kicked off with 'I Was Glad' by Charles Parry. The choir performed many pieces which were played at the Queen's coronation. These included: 'Zadok the Priest-Handel;' 'O taste and see'- Vaughan Williams and 'God Save the Queen,' of course. They are impactful, joyous pieces and it is tradition that they are played at Queen Elizabeth's Jubilees.

As well as the choir there were: brass, percussion, a string quartet and of course the organ. The result was extremely powerful. When I first sang with them, I thought it was amazing to hear the music echo around the church, so loud it felt like it could be heard for miles outside.

My personal favourite pieces were 'Zadok the Priest' and 'The King Shall Rejoice.' They are both very difficult to sing but it was worth a sore throat to hear the spectacular sound.

To finish off, I would like to thank Tom Howling - who pulled the whole event together, not to mention also conducting the choir; Caroline Monk - who pulled together an incredible orchestra as well as playing violin herself; the team involved in decorating the church; and the brass, percussion, string quartet and organist.


and had a commemorative book of the Coronation which started with this poem which features a few birds.



Rumours have been heard recently that summer has arrived and with it the commencement of the new cricket season. Of course this brings the perennial problem of enticing out of hibernation the previous year's players. Not all are keen to move out of their winter comfort surroundings, but with the aid of various inducements, a motley team was gathered for the first match at home to Rostherne.

At the start of the season, the strengths of each side is never known, but this first match proves to be exciting. The visitors were invited to bat first and steadily accumulated runs, but were kept quiet by Mellor's recalcitrant fast bowler, who, because of increasing physical problems, had resorted to a slower style of delivery, which brought a haul of five wickets, but not before Rostherne had reached a very respectable 167 all out. As the temperature fell, the Mellor batsmen were happy to cower in the pavilion, but successive batsmen made welcome contributions and, although wickets fell regularly, the target was reached with the last pair at the wicket.

On the following week, Mellor travelled to Glazebury, and were invited to bat first. A mammoth 273 for seven wickets was achieved, thanks to a second wicket stand of over 150, which included a big hundred comprised mainly of boundaries. No point in running singles when you don't need to. The home side must have become exhausted in retrieving the ball from the various out-reaches of the ground and in consequence their reply was a meagre 57 all out. This was made possible by two juniors, who had been promoted, taking eight wickets between them.

Again Mellor were obliged to travel for the next match but only as far as Cheadle Hulme. The home side won the toss and chose to bat first. The Mellor bowling was minus the junior contingent, due to school commitments, but even so were able to make steady inroads into the Cheadle Hulme batting, and bowled them all out for 98. In reply Mellor's centurion of the previous week was out for single figures, proving that the game of cricket can be a great leveller, but the team still managed to pass the Cheadle Hulme's total for the loss of just three wickets.

Will this winning sequence continue? We'll have to see!

Meanwhile the club have been able to field four junior teams at various age groups, thanks to the encouragement and dedication of parents and seniors. The results of the matches have been mixed, but most have been won. It's very interesting to see the raw talent coming through.

Captain Ken

Before actually going to sea in the Merchant Navy, at the age of

seventeen, I was quite keen on jazz music, and expected it would be just one of many interests I would have to forgo. To my surprise, this did not turn out to be the case.

In the late fifties and early sixties I was serving as a junior officer on the 'Ulysses' running between the Far East and east coast of America. Of course in those days, BC, (before containers), cargo ships spent at least fifty per cent of the voyage, in port, loading and discharging cargo. This of course gave us a wonderful opportunity to enjoy shore life and make many friends, all over the world.

We were in New York, in a particularly bad spell of winter weather, and people had been advised on the radio, not to venture out, as snow blizzards were rampant. I had noted that my favourite jazz singer, Peggy Lee, was appearing at the 'Copa Cabana', which I considered to be the greatest night club.

All road traffic had ceased, but

we were berthed in Brooklyn close to the underground railway, and so could make the journey. Although hardly any audience had been able to make it, the huge cabaret and orchestra continued as normal, and was fantastic. The Copa dancers being equal to the famous Tiller girls. And it felt as if Peggy Lee was singing specially for us. Her greatest hit at the time was 'The folk who live on the Hill'. I've often wondered if that had anything to do with my eventual choice of residence.

On another occasion when berthed in Boston, Massachusetts, my friend and I were outside the Storyville night club, where the Count Basie Orchestra was expected to play. A friendly chap at the door

approached us and asked if we were English, having heard us



talk. He asked if we had heard of a place called Warrington, as he had been stationed there, while serving in the U.S. Air Force, and loved every minute. This must of course have been Burtonwood. We managed to get a table, right at

the front, and as one of the greatest



No Bake Fudge Slice

Jill Baker

This is a version of the ever popular, no bake slices of my childhood. This one is from my Scottish friend Alison who I have known from university days. She used to leave a box at her cottage in Biggar for us and it was devoured in moments. A good dish to make for the Fête as it will freeze or keep for making with children or grandchildren during the summer holidays.

100g/4oz butter

40ml/2 tbsp golden syrup

200g/8oz sweet biscuits such as digestives

25g/1oz raisins

50g/2oz quartered glace cherries

125g/5oz plain chocolate such as Bournville chopped

Fudge icing

50g/2oz plain chocolate

40ml/2tbsp water

25g butter

150g/6oz sieved icing sugar

0.5kg/1lb Loaf tin greased with butter or lined.

Melt the butter and syrup in a pan gently. Crush the biscuits but not too finely. Add the biscuits, chopped chocolate, cherries and raisins. Mix well and press firmly into the tin. Leave to harden overnight.

To make the icing, break the chocolate into squares and melt gently in a pan with the water and butter. Once liquid, take off the heat and beat in the icing sugar continuing to beat until smooth and thick. Spread over the cake and leave to set.

- The latest from the PCC

The PCC (Parochial Church Council), had its last meeting on 25th April 2022, and these are the main points we discussed;

- 1. It was agreed that the funds raised in aid of the Ukraine appeal should be sent to the Disasters Emergency Committee (DEC) as this was a recognised means of ensuring that the funds went to the areas of greatest need and DEC were working with a number of charities to achieve the best outcomes.
- 2. Richard Elliott (Treasurer) took the meeting through the end of year (2021) accounts and presented the PCC's Annual Report and Financial Statements. He confirmed that the accounts had been independently examined by Kate Scott and that she had given assurance as to their accuracy. Richard contrasted the final year-end position with that in the budget that was set at the beginning of 2021. He explained that St Thomas' had benefited from some generous legacies that were received during the year. There was also a decision to reduce the level of Parish Share that was paid to the Diocese of Chester, during the year, and this will be kept under review. Richard informed the PCC

- that Kate Scott had agreed to act as Independent Examiner once again, and the PCC wished to record their thanks to Kate for agreeing to do this work at no cost to the PCC.
- 3. Kathy Maxwell is one of the PCC's Safeguarding Leads, and she reminded PCC members of the safeguarding training they all need to undertake, to remain up to date with the requirements of the Diocese
- 4. William Heijbroek reported back on the results of the survey he carried out recently, canvassing people's views on what work should be done to improve the church porch. The PCC agreed that the priority was to carry out the basic remedial work needed. such as repainting, and that further work could be done to look at options for a new door, with costings. William also confirmed that the quinquennial inspection of the church building had been arranged for the week ending 20th May.
- 5. This year's APCM will take place at 11.45am on 11th May, in the Parish Centre. Discussions to identify new Churchwardens prepared to serve for the coming year were ongoing.

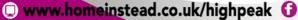
