Mellor Birds

I have never expected to hear a nightingale in Mellor but on March 26th I did just that. It was in church at the Andrew Dean organ concert. During one of the pieces

Andrew Dean asked John LeGrove our church organist to accompany him by playing a 'nightingale' at various times. (photo below) It looks like an ornate metal pipe which John blew into. Inside the pipe was a small amount of water.

Last week Jill B. told me she had been walking up to Robin Hood's Picking Rods and around Far Slack in a circle and came across a field of golden plover. These wading birds have spent the winter at the coast and come up to the moors to breed. I think their breeding plumage is very smart. They have a jet black chest and golden

spangly backs; slightly larger than a blackbird; and have this distinctive mournful 'peeoo peeoo'.

To see golden plovers I often go up to the Snake Pass in early June, in the early evening, and walk south on The Pennine Way for about 15 minutes or so and then you start to hear 'peeoo's' and you can see single birds by their nests. It's best to take hat and gloves as it can be cold even in June.



I am reading a book by J.A Baker called *The Hill of Summer*. This is how he described golden plovers "Their black chest shone in the sun below mustard yellow of their backs, like black shoes half covered with buttercup dust." I have not heard of Swallow sightings in Mellor yet. (April 18th). The curlews can be heard bubbling up near Five Lane Ends and near the Brownie Inn at Rowarth. Margaret Lowe on Old Hall Lane took a photo of a greenfinch on her bird feeder.

Manchester Tart

Jill Baker

This is not part of my history but I thought I should research it and my grandson has been delighted.

You need a 22cm baked tart case. Options are to buy one or buy a sheet of shortcrust pastry and make one, probably the most challenging part of this recipe is baking blind a tart case. You can make my recipe given for strawberry tarts and previously for mince pies or your own favourite pastry.

Filling Option one.
575ml/1 pt whole milk
3 tbsp custard powder
3 tbsp caster sugar
1 tsp vanilla extract
Make custard in your usual
way (follow packet instructions)
and leave to cool with cling film
covering the surface (touching
to stop a skin forming)

To complete your tart with either option

200g / 7 oz raspberry jam 6 tbsp desiccated coconut Optional fresh raspberries Spread the base of your tart with a thick layer of jam and then 3tbsp of coconut. Spoon the custard over in an even layer. Sprinkle with remaining coconut (which can be toasted in a dry pan)and serve with raspberries if liked - they can be used to decorate the tart too. Filling Option two
5 egg yolks
Vanilla pod or 1 tsp vanilla
extract

500ml / 17 fl oz whole milk

125g /4 ½ oz caster sugar

4 tablespoons cornflour 300ml double cream whipped into soft peaks. To make this custard heat the milk and vanilla pod to just below boiling and simmer for 2 mins then remove vanilla pod. Beat egg and sugar together and then beat in cornflour slowly add the hot milk to this mixture whisking all the time until it is smooth. Pour back in the pan and heat until it thickens stirring continuously. Set aside to cool then chill for 30 minutes in a clean bowl in the fridge, cover with cling film to prevent a skin forming. When cool whisk the cream into the thick custard.

Ed. This is another very yummy recipe. The Manchester tarts I ate at school (probably once a week for ten years) had cornflakes on top.

Christian Aid together with many other agencies are actively working to support Ukrainian refugees. However as well as this important work, they are continuing to support those many other people across the world who go hungry daily.

Ken Owen

Captain Ken

Sailing home from the Far East through the Suez canal was nearly always a pleasant experience. Though I'm sure that it's not at all how the officers and crew of the mega sized container ship, 'Ever Given' felt last year when, for six days, their grounding simply stopped round the world container traffic. An incident that is still being felt to this very day.

One homeward passage that I clearly remember would be in 1954. I was a twenty year old Midshipman, on a Blue Funnel cargo/passenger liner. I was assisting the bridge team, as a lookout, and totally surprised when I spotted a person swimming in the canal, very close to the ship.

When I drew the Captain's attention to this, I was amazed that he seemed immediately to know the reason why.

The ship in front of us was a French Troop ship, and he was aware that the world renowned French Foreign Legion was being transferred from Vietnam, or Indo China as we then knew it, to Algeria where a war of independence had broken out.

The only way that legionnaire troops could desert was to jump overboard as their ship transited the Suez Canal, and surrender to the Egyptian Army and hopefully get transferred back to Europe. The French Foreign Legion was renowned as one of toughest armies in the world, and would readily enlist men of any nationality. They had fought for many years enabling France to control her colonies, but had finally been defeated by the Viet Minh at the battle of Dien Bien Phu.

As the French reluctantly pulled out the Americans replaced them and the truly terrible war continued for several more years.

So in 1954 they were transferred by troop-ships to Algeria until 1962, when Algeria gained it's independence, and the Legion was greatly reduced. Our pilot told us that in order to try and prevent intended deserters jumping overboard during the Canal transit, no legionnaires were allowed near the ship's rails, and military police were stationed at the ship's side, prepared to shoot

any intended deserter. This made it necessary for any deserter to dive over the side, directly into the water.

As we proceeded along, we saw dozens of these strong fit and bronzed soldiers climbing up the canal banks and

surrendering to the Egyptian armed police, and many of our crew gave them a cheer, and they waved goodbye to us.

It was known that many of the

Foreign Legion had joined directly from the German Army at the end of World War 2 and so would be anxious to return to Germany. In the Suez Canal great Bitter Lake, we spotted a navigation buoy with six deserters clinging to it. This was before we had

VHF radio communication and our only way of notifying the Canal Authorities of the necessary rescue, was for our Radio Officer to send out a Morse code message. We were pleased to learn later from our Agents in Port Said, that they had been rescued.

Matters Arising

This will be publicised in May.

Annual Fête – The fête team are currently consulting on a date for this year's fete, but asked for someone to take on a role in coordinating the event. Angus Wilson has kindly agreed to step in and step up!

Inclusive church – Following the successful running of the 'Living in Love and Faith' course, the PCC is considering joining the 'Inclusive

Church' movement, which aims to promote the inclusive values of the church in its widest sense. It was agreed that an open discussion



should take place, but rather than do this at the APCM, an open PCC meeting may be a better vehicle for this discussion.

Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM) This is the annual meeting which takes place, in the Parish Centre, and is planned for 15th May 2022. We still need candidates for new Church Wardens, who will be voted in at the APCM. We're still canvassing for volunteers!


In April our speaker was Katie Hill, a local sheep farmer, and Rowarth's answer to Amanda Owen, the Yorkshire Shepherdess!

Jaunts with Judy

Railway Walk No 4 Whaley Bridge Circular 3 miles allow 2 ½ hours This is a pleasant walk that steadily ascends past Toddbrook Reservoir and into the hills above Whaley Bridge and returns along the canal. There are two tricky stiles. An OS map would be useful.

Getting there There is an hourly train from Hazel Grove, Disley or New Mills Newtown stations. These stations are on the Manchester to Buxton Line. There is a free car park in the centre of Whaley Bridge near to the canal.

Facilities en route Plenty of cafes in Whaley Bridge. There are toilets at the Tesco Store.

Directions

- 1.From the car park at Whaley Bridge Station turn right and under the railway bridge. Cross over the road and head up Reservoir Road. The reservoir will be on your left. Continue ahead, ignoring two footpath signs on the right. Continue past an interesting house called Kishfield. Look for a sign for Glebe Cottage that is high up on a tree. Go through the stone gateway and on the right is a footpath with a yellow way marker.
- 2. Follow this path up hill through a wood. You will pass a bench on the right. This is a good place to stop and admire the view.
- 3. When you meet a fence at the top turn right and take care going over a stile and follow a path by a house which will bring you out onto a lane.
- 4. At the lane turn left, you will go past a garage with Croft Cottage on it. Bear right at the footpath which is opposite Slatersbank. Keeping the stone wall on your right follow it up the hill. Continue through a wooden gate and continue ahead with the stone wall on your right. You will cross a small stream with a large concrete pipe as a bridge. Fantastic views at this point.
- 5. Continue to a track. Here there is a green footpath sign. To the right of this is a concealed stone stile. Go over this stile, the stone wall should now be on your left. When the wall ends continue on the track round to a road.
- 6. Cross the road and look for the footpath sign next to the Boarding Kennels. Go through onto the footpath.
- 7. Keeping the stone wall on your left continue ahead through a stone stile and a metal gate. You will come to an open field.
- 8. Go across the field bearing slightly left. Caravans should come into view. Go through a wide gap in the stone wall the caravan site can now be clearly seen. Follow the wall on the left. You will cross a stream and go through a metal gate, the caravan site is on the left.

- 9. Walk up the track to the site entrance. On your right is a footpath sign with a small gate. This is a tricky stone stile to scramble down. Head straight down this marshy field, a small wood is on the right. A small reservoir will come into view. Head for the small wooden gate.
- 10. Go through the gate and follow the track down to a metal gate at an industrial yard. Go across the yard and head down under the railway bridge.
- 11. Continue straight ahead to the A6. Cross over by the traffic island. Cross the canal footbridge and follow the towpath under the road. Cross another footbridge at the canal junction and follow the towpath back to Whaley Bridge.

An UnHoly War

In 1095 Pope Urban 11 launched the age of crusades "Assail and drive out the Turks, more execrable than the Jebusites, who are in this land, and may you deem it a beautiful thing to die for Christ in that city in which he died for us."

In 2022 Patriarch Kirill, Head of the Russian Orthadox Church blessed Putin's "special operation" in Ukraine to oust the monsters and Nazis polluting "Holy Rus". The club currently has three senior mens' teams, a senior ladies' team and eight boys' and girls' teams that all compete at a high level.


As a club we have always 'punched above our weight' winning national titles and producing international players over the years!

Clowning around

Once, as a student, I had a very unusual holiday job. The Moscow State Circus came to Belle Vue for a four week period, and hired twelve ringhands. I was one of them. We carried apparatus



on and off, rolled and unrolled carpets, swept up thousands of fragments of glitter after every performance and, alarmingly, had to collect a Cossack horse as it galloped riderless out of the ring. Watching rehearsals, and learning our tasks, I was fascinated by Oleg Popov, the clown. He watched all the acts, which had been picked from all over the Soviet Union, and then 'spoofed' each one. He could do everything – juggle, walk a tightrope, tumble – and I realised that in Russia the clown is not a slapstick idiot, but someone who holds a mirror up to our own foolishness. So, with us, he watched a man and wife act which involved the man climbing a vertical ladder with his wife



on his head. At the top, she did a one-handed headstand as he swung to the other side of the ladder and precariously descended. Popov sought us out and indicated that he wanted a pair of step ladders and a sweeping brush. With great deliberation and much show of careful positioning, he put the ladders in the centre of

the ring, then balanced the brush on his head and climbed the ladders. At the top he did a Buster Keaton-like step into space, pretended panic, then shambolically descended, still with the brush on his head. He did this with every act. The Volzhansky family tightrope act was followed by Popov with a washing line and a basket of washing. This led to him performing a ridiculously clever slack wire act as his attempts to peg out the washing turned to chaos. And so it went on; every act followed by clowning genius. He was not an easy man; aloof, he did not mix with the other circus folk who were very much 'a family'. But he was a genius, and for me it was a holiday job with a difference.


