Like all of you, this Vicar is beginning a new year - looking forward to it's adventures, anticipating there will be struggles, joys, surprises and sadness, and praying that God's grace will help me through it all.

Like all of you I want to live this year well, feel like I am a good person, and bring the peace and love of God into the places I go and the relationships I have.

Like all of you I want to do my bit to make the world a better place, a safer place, a more just and caring place.

Like all of you I live around here: I walk up to church with my partner Sian, I sit and pray and sing and listen in the pews. In many ways I am just like you. And that has been a joy.

Anna Chaplain Who was Anna? And why does she matter?

Anna was one of the first people in the Bible to recognise Jesus as Messiah. She is described as a woman of deep faith who was there when the baby Jesus was presented in the Temple at Jerusalem (Luke 2:26-28). The only other fact we know is that she was an elderly widow of "84 years." So Anna was a senior citizen with a strong love for God. Is it any surprise that she was chosen as a role model for a new ministry to older people?

That matters to me as I hope to become an "Anna chaplain".

I was blessed as a child to know three of my grandparents. The only one I don't remember was my Dad's father who died when I was a baby. I've only heard stories of him doing rounds as an ARP warden with his cat, "Binx". My Dad's Mum, Grandma, lived with us for several years. She struggled with deafness but shared her love by teaching us how to cook. (See "Baking Day" in my poetry book: "Volume the Fifth"- for sale in aid of church funds.) My Mum's Mum. "Gran", made breakfast for my sister and me, then walked us to school. She was a very creative person, teaching us how to make flower pictures. When she was 80, she decided to teach herself how to paint with oils! Her husband, my "Grandpa", seemed formal and a bit intimidating until we went on holiday together. There was no one better at building motor boats on a sandy beach. Plus when we played cards together he had us in stitches with laughter!

Later, I spent time as a volunteer befriending older people. One was special: Doris was housebound due to a heart condition but she showed tremendous courage and a strong faith. I always found her in a positive and cheerful mood. More recently I became friends with a remarkable lady. She often talked about her war time adventures as a Land Army girl - the "time of her life". She did not have a conventional faith but had a natural spirituality. This was clear from her creativity as an artist, a writer and a loyal friend. I was privileged to walk beside her during her final weeks of life. I had the honour of speaking at her funeral. I trust that when she reached Heaven she was welcomed for using her "one hundred fold talents"!

I have learnt to respect older people for their wisdom, their courage in adversity and their delight in friendship. I have been impressed by the strength of their faith whatever the circumstances. I enjoy their company and listening to them. I find it natural to love them.

When I heard of "Anna chaplains", who offer ministry to older people, I realised that God was calling me to follow my vocation. I am grateful for the support of Mellor Church who are funding my training. My course, run by the Bible Reading Fellowship, is to start in February. I would appreciate your support in prayer as I step out in faith. I hope to keep you informed of my progress. I am confident only of this: that our Lord will walk with me."

Mellor Birds

I've had a couple of magical moments birdwatching with my binoculars this month.





Last week I was taking Sprocket from the Royal Oak up to Damsteads, across Linnet Clough and the Golf Course and down and over the railway bridge by Strawberry Hill. At this point I saw a tiny bird flitting about in a tree by the path in the Strawberry Hill

meadow behind the house. Eventually I saw the golden yellow stripe on its head to confirm it was a **goldcrest**.

Just before the cold spell arrived on a sunny morning about 11am I saw four **chaffinches** on our drive. Even though they are a common bird I can never remember in forty two years seeing one in our garden before. The white 'T' shape on their wings lets you know its a chaffinch. At the same time a tree creeper (looks like a mouse) started climbing up our alder tree and then a nuthatch started to climb down the tree at the same time.

Looking over the hedge into the War Memorial garden the blackbird was in its usual spot on the apple tree with a robin a few branches

down. Then fifteen or so redwings dived into the lowest of the yew trees and three **mistle thrushes** were sitting around the top of the yew together with a greenfinch which seems to like being with the redwings. A single song thrush joined them.

Gold finches joined the chaffinches in the alder tree with a great tit and a coal tit. The telegraph pole by the lower park gate had two starlings on it followed by two jackdaws with a pigeon flying over and some Canada geese doing a flypast. This all happened in about ten minutes and then they were gone. It was a magical moment for me.

I like to buy Seville oranges - a truly seasonal product only available in January. As well as making marmalade they also make a delicious orange curd to spread on your toast, fill a tart or a cake, stir into plain yogurt.

Do not worry if you would like to make this and cannot get Seville oranges simply use 3 normal oranges preferably unwaxed and 2 lemons.

5 Seville oranges150g caster sugar250g cold butter diced3 whole eggs beaten

Finely grate the rind from the oranges. Squeeze the oranges to give 220mls of juice (pass through a sieve to avoid the many pips in these oranges).

Put all the ingredients into a small heavy base saucepan. Over a very low heat stir the mixture until it has thickened enough so that it thickly coats the back of a wooden spoon. It will set further when it cools

Pour into clean jars. This makes 2 smallish jars. Keep in the refrigerator and eat within a couple of weeks.




Rose Queen News

My sea life has certainly been full of surprises.

But I must say that last week was certainly one of the nicest. My wife Allwyn and I, were invited by Princess Anne to attend a Reception at St James's Palace. The occasion was the seventy fifth birthday of the

Royal Institute of Navigation, of which her father, Prince Philip, was a leading light, I am privileged to be a Fellow.

St James's Palace is a magnificent building, and was of course the Sovereign's residence until Buckingham Palace was built. We were shown how a window was removed, to enable King Charles III, to give his Proclamation following the Queen's death. The reception was held in the Queen Anne room, and was a most friendly and relaxed gathering, with the Princess Royal taking the trouble to personally greet virtually all the some 150 guests, individually.

I was reminded of a very different surprise, when I was 4th Officer on the Blue Funnel ship 'Eurybates' in 1956'. We were bound from U.K. to Indonesia, and before we reached there, the combined forces of Britain, France and Israel had invaded Egypt, to control the Suez Canal. Consequently, the various ports in Indonesia, had been instructed to harass British and French ships calling there.

Our first port of call was Balikpapan in Borneo. We had run out of fresh water, at the end of our passage, and found to our surprise, when we anchored, that the port Authority refused to supply us with any.

In those days, ships were unable to de-salinate sea water, and relied on supply by barge from ashore. We were fortunate to have extra life boats on 'Eurybates' as it was customary to carry pilgrims from Indonesia to Jeddah in the Hajj season.

But although it was inconvenient to drink the life boat fresh water, cook with sea water and wash using salt-water soap, what really worried us, was that we needed the fresh water for the engine room boiler, without which the ship's engine could not be used.

Eurybates' had originally been built with a combined steam and diesel engine, but later converted to pure diesel, due to the double number of qualified engineers required, when both steam and motor. Eventually, the harbour master took pity on us, and afraid we might die of thirst, supplied us with about fifty tonnes.



Our Chief Engineer, immediately put it all in the boiler, and we heaved up the anchor, started the engines and made off to friendly Singapore, where we could have as much water as we wanted.

Outlook report on PCC meeting in November



This was our last meeting of the year, and we began with a small celebration (which involved cake), of the end of Chris Mann's 22 years of running the Christmas Eve Crib Service. He was thanked for all the magic it has brought to the start of Christmas, for so many people.

We then had some visitors to the meeting. First were Peter Lowe and Mike Barley, from the Parish Centre Management Committee. They came to plead for support in trying to recruit people to the management committee, and to the Friends of the Parish Centre, as the membership of these groups has dwindled to very few over the last number of years. We agreed there needed to be a publicity campaign in church but also in the community, to raise awareness of how valuable the Centre is, but that people are needed to help with the running of it, if it is to continue.

Secondly, we welcomed Angie Stanton, recently retired vicar of St Elizabeth's in Reddish, who has joined our congregation. She hopes to get her official go-ahead to lead services, from the beginning of 2023, and is kindly offering to start helping us to cover services at St Thomas', until we recruit a new vicar of our own. We

were also very glad to hear she would like to help us to

do more work with children.

We also discussed the fire safety survey that has been done in church recently, to look at ways of improving our level of safety precautions. A fire safety plan was agreed, which will involve some training of the stewards on the doors at services, to ensure the church could be evacuated as quickly as possible in the event of a fire.

Finally, as Secretary of the PCC, I would like to wish everyone a Happy Christmas and New Year.

Gastropods: Ammonites: Crinoids: Orthocones

At the interval of the November Church concert I asked Joh Rosser (an alto in our Church choir) what she was knitting at the moment and to my surprise she said 'I am crocheting fossils for the Buxton Museum'!

To explain, here are a few words from Katie Potter, Buxton Crescent Heritage Trust Education Manager:-

Did you know that most of the Peak District was once a tropical sea? Buxton Museum and Art Gallery have a collection of intriguing and unique objects telling 350 million years of Peak District history. The collection includes some fascinating fossils. Keen to help children understand what the fossilised creatures would have looked like when they were alive - the museum commissioned Joh Rosser to research, design and crochet colourful creatures for the new Geology Object Handling Box. The box of rock specimens, crocheted creatures and fossils will be available for schools to use. for free, from January. Ros Westwood,

Derbyshire Museums Manager describes Joh as "a very clever crocheter!".

Joh writes:-

It's amazing what you can whip up using a hook, yarn and a bag of stuffing. Bringing fossils to life has been a diverting departure from the usual snoods, hats and mitts

most often associated with the craft of crochet. The spiralling shells of ammonites and gastropods, and the symmetry rules of brachiopods and crinoids have a pleasing mathematical appeal to me.

These delightful critters have been created using Peruvian cotton; its long fibres give this robust yarn a silky lustre.

Short stitches (UK double crochet and halftriple crochet) create a compact body that securely envelops the stuffing and, by

working in the back-loops only, the "ribbed" texture is created on the shells. The longer feather-like stitches on the "arms" of the crinoid are created using a form of Tunisian crochet, where many stitches are gathered on the hook, secured and then "dropped off" the hook

a couple at a time, somewhat akin to knitting. These arms are crocheted around plastic tubing to provide some structure and prevent them from simply curling up on themselves.

I've learnt such a lot about fossils by taking part in this project (and that I find crocheting much easier than photographing the results!). Joh Rosser, Very Clever Crocheter

Youthful Days in Mellor 1910-26 Part 4 Tom Oldham

When I was five I started at Mellor School, just below the Church, and went along with Norman on the first morning. He, being slightly older than I, had started a month or so earlier, and he was able to help me in surviving my first day. It was a somewhat frightening experience to be



flung into such a large crowd of strange children, and I think the noisy, rough games in the playground were the worst part of it. I didn't mind the work in the classroom, where everything was quiet and orderly. Although so long ago, I can remember several features of that infant room quite clearly - a counting frame on a stand with different coloured balls that slid along wires, some slates, almost discarded and obsolete by that time, but still a little used, copperplate handwriting copy books, words chalked on the blackboard by Miss Pike, the infant mistress, - cat, mat, rat, etc.

The school was centrally heated with a boiler in the basement which was attended to by Mr



Hambleton who lived at the farm just down the lane, opposite Lower Hall gates. He came in periodically to stoke it up and clear out the ashes. There was a fireplace in the infant room which was often lit for warming up dinners, and for boosting up the temperature as this room was furthest away from the boiler. Many of the children came from the farms. and a large number wore clogs. I envied those that did as they were able to strike sparks with their clog irons on the stones, and also they were more to be feared in the rough games of football, as the clogs were very hard, with brass toecaps. The 1914 - 1918 war was in progress in my first years, and I remember the whole school being let out into the playground to see a flight of four aeroplanes go over. All the children, whatever their age and wherever they lived, walked to and from school, and there

were three brothers of the name of McNaughton who lived at "Three Chimneys" near Soldiers Knob, at the top of Cobden Edge. Nothing whatever was thought of this, and no one would ever, at that time, have considered a walk of two miles to school in all weathers for children of 5 to be a hardship. Those living too far away to walk home at midday would bring their meals to school, and eat them in the classrooms. Pies, basins of stew, and bottles of tea and cocoa were stood round the infant room fire to warm up in the late morning, and I remember a cork blowing out of a bottle of tea with a loud bang.

I doubt if anyone was unable to read or write or do simple sums by the time they passed up into the next form room at the age of seven. The teacher in this room was Miss Marsland, or "Aunt Maggie" as she was called. She had the reputation of being somewhat of a tartar, and she punished by rapping ones knuckles with a wooden ruler. In her class I remember more than anything else learning multiplication tables by constant repetition, an exercise which I believe is now scorned and ridiculed by modern teaching, but which has proved of great and constant use to me throughout life.

Thought for the Month Perpetual Choirs

I've always been fascinated by reading that some Abbeys (Glastonbury for example) had perpetual choirs. These had shifts of choristers taking over every hour of the day and night in rotation, perpetuating the praise and adoration of God without rest or intermission.

The reason it comes to mind is that in December, St Thomas' had its own perpetual choir. This is how it came about: in the absence of a vicar we have a rota of volunteers to lock and unlock the church. To create a Christmas atmosphere, it was decided to play quiet carols continuously - but what do you do when you lock the church for the night? When it was my turn in the past, I always recited the ancient Celtic prayer for closing a church for the night:

"Lord God, may the prayers offered up to you in this church today be acceptable in Thy sight and we ask for Your blessing and protection during the night hours both for this church and all its worshippers." In the end, to circumvent the unlocking and locking cycle, it was decided to run carols perpetually for the whole of December and the church's electronic Einstein, Peter Williams, created a perpetual choir in a little black box and hid it in the pulpit! So we had a perpetual choir and I imagined evening dog walkers passing through the churchyard, hearing worshipful sounds emanating from the church. In Medieval times Glastonbury Abbey was joined by Old Sarum (Salisbury) and perhaps Bangor where for year after year singing would never cease. These perpetual choirs wanted to show undying adulation of God and they even felt that by their chanting they were supporting the dome of heaven with harmony and peace — what a wonderful thought!

I wonder what today we should aspire to be our perpetual offering to God? I think I know what would please Him today: working tirelessly and perpetually to protect and restore the beautiful world He created and has entrusted to us.


