Vicar's Viewpoint

As I write this, I reflect that it is only just a month since my induction. Yet it feels much longer than that. That is partly because everything is so new and there is so much to take in. But more than that, it is because you have made

us so welcome that we have quickly begun to feel we belong.

I mentioned in my letter last month that for the last ten years I have been in a training job, and have taken very few baptisms, weddings or funerals in that time. These services are called 'occasional offices' - not because they happen occasionally but because they mark important occasions in people's lives. During this first month, I have taken at least one of each - and I felt again that immense privilege of sharing in those special moments in the lives of people who are not regular churchgoers. The occasional offices give us a wonderful opportunity to welcome many people from the wider community into our church. The stewards have a vital role in representing the church at these services, but many more of you contribute to the impression that visitors receive: those who maintain the churchyard, who keep the church clean, who keep the noticeboards attractive and up to date, who arrange the flowers, the bellringers and the musicians. All of these tell a visitor something about the kind of church we are, and also about our love of God, as manifested in our care for this house of prayer.

It is also my experience that we encounter people through the occasional offices in moments of spiritual openness. There is a quality of mystery in birth, love and mortality; and when people come close to these things it often raises big questions: about the purpose of life, about the hereafter, and about God. Already this month, I have had several fascinating conversations.

Nationally the number of occasional offices conducted by the Church of England is going down year by year: fewer people are bringing their children for baptism, fewer weddings are taking place in church, and more people are turning to civil celebrants for funerals. I am delighted that St. Thomas seems to be bucking that trend. I have no doubt that the church's beautiful setting is a significant factor in this. Let's make the most of that opportunity, by doing all we can to make these occasional offices *special* occasions. And let us pray that through the welcome and the care and the quality of worship we offer, visitors may encounter something of the hospitality and love of God.

Mellor Birds

After a Pilates class in the Parish Centre I heard a lovely story about a **Barn Owl**, (Tyto alba), from Jean C. Jean lives up Moor End

Road and had told me previously she had seen a barn owl in the field behind her house, but now apparently it is flying across the road in the direction of Lorkhill Lock.

is flying across the road in the direction of Larkhill. I asked what





time of day she saw it and she replied "Oh at dusk when I am sitting watching television - it flies past the window." I have never heard of anyone managing to birdwatch while watching the TV before. Further up the hill on Shiloh Road where

the bus turns round, Pat O. tells me a **whitethroat**, (Sylvia communis), has been heard. They are usually hiding in a hedge but you can hear a scritchyscratchy noise. They are about the size of a robin with a grey head, white throat and beautiful pinkish wash across his breast.

The female is duller with a white eye ring. In winter they migrate south of the Sahara to the thorn scrub of the Sahel. Their old country name is "nettle creeper" which is its preferred



nesting site in a cup of dry grass. Also heard in the area of the bus turn round area has been a **little owl**, (Athene Noctua). They are up to 9 inches tall and look quite cuddly to me with big yellow eyes. They have a habit of using conspicuous daytime perches. I have seen them on stone walls and chimneys.

Their song is a repeated plaintive 'kiu' and the call is a loud ringing 'werro.'

Diana tells me the 385 bus service up to Shiloh Road is really good now. Goes roughly once an hour from 8.00am ish until 6.30ish; not on Sundays. You can do great walks from the top. See QR code for bus timetable.

OPPENHEIMER and his CONSEQUENCES - Guy Nicholls

You may have had the time and interest to watch 'Oppenheimer' recently. One member of St Thomas' had the 'privelege' of watching the

results of the scientist's work a little nearer - Guy Nicholls.

"I said farewell to the coal mines of South Wales where I had spent 12 months after




leaving school at 15. I also said farewell to my grandparents who had brought me up after my mother had left for London many years before. I moved to London but that did not work out too well so it was not long



before I signed up for the Navy. After 6 weeks of 'square bashing' I was asked to choose which section of the Navy to join and I began training as a Telegraphist attending Courses on Morse Code. I soon mastered it and could reach 25 words a minute easily. The ship I

joined, HMS Warrior, was an aircraft carrier. We set off quite soon on the journey to Christmas Island which proved very difficult as we passed through a hurricane. Even on an aircraft carrier we were having to bail out water from our living spaces. The ship turned out to be in very bad condition and was eventually sold to the Argentinians on the way home (?) We reached our position off Christmas Island in 1957?

I witnessed the 3 tests of the British Hydrogen Bomb along with many others. An A.B.C.D. officer (anti biological chemical defence) told us to put on heavy goggles; put our hands up to cover our eyes as well and turn our backs to the bomb while waiting for it to detonate.



A naval officer on HMS Warrior described the shipboard's atmosphere of "excitement, anxiety and awe when the first bomb was dropped." Another said, "When it went off, first of all there was the flash and I saw the bones in my hand like an X-ray." We had to count to 10 and then we were allowed to turn around and look at the explosion. It was a terrifying but an amazing and remarkable sight, a cauldron of fire - like seeing a mini-sun being born." The mushroom was pulling a big trunk of water upwards and, when it fell down, it caused a small tsunami, which rocked the ship terribly. "Where we were positioned we saw birds and seagulls, which had been blinded by the flash, flying around aimlessly and falling into the water." The ship had been used as a marker to guide the planes to the Malden Island where the bombs were actually dropped. When the mission was completed the pilot reported "Bomb gone, let's get the hell out of here." This sentence "Bomb gone, sir," went right up through the ranks to the Vice Admiral. We returned home wonderering what the future might hold...... Guy Nichols & MML

Gingery Plum Cake

Jill Baker

The September plums look and taste good in this cake - an upside down cake. This is from the Good Food Magazine.

550g plums

2tbsp demerara sugar and butter for greasing

175g butter

175g dark muscovado sugar

140g golden syrup

2 eggs beaten

200ml milk

300g SR flour

½ tsp bicarb

1 tbsp ground ginger

1 tsp mixed spice



Heat the oven to 180°C GM4. Grease and line a 23cm square tin.

Then generously butter the paper and sprinkle with the demerara sugar.

Halve the plums and arrange on the base of the tin cut side down.

Melt the butter, muscovado sugar and syrup in a large pan slowly, cool for 10 mins. Now beat in the eggs and milk, then sift in the dry ingredients and mix to a smooth batter.

Pour over the plums and bake for 45-55 minutes. Cool in the tin for 10 mins and then tip out. Eat warm as a pudding with some ice cream/crème fraiche. Cool and eat as a cake. Keeps well wrapped in the fridge for up to 5 days.

AS SEEN FROM COW CORNER



The local village cricket team are ever hopeful of putting together a string of wins this season, in order to improve their position in the league table from next to bottom. As yet, however, victories have been scarce.

In a rain reduced game, to 32 overs each, Mellor visited Northwich and on winning the toss, invited the hosts to bat first. Runs were difficult to score on the damp outfield, and in order to increase the run rate the batsmen embarked on some suicidal running between the wickets with the consequence that four of their batsmen were run out. At the end of their innings, Northwich had reached 122 for eight wickets. This would normally have been an easy target, but because of the wet outfield, it was difficult to find the boundary, with the result that Mellor reached just 102 runs for the loss of three wickets in their allotted overs.

Of the next three games, two were completely washed out without a ball being bowled. On the intervening week, with a very depleted side, Mellor visited Disley, who won the toss and put Mellor in. Not for the first time this year, Mellor batted without any ambition and struggled to being all out for 105. This was never going to be a challenging target for Disley, and helped by an unbroken stand of 70, they came out winners by eight wickets.

On the following week Mellor travelled to Timperley with hopes of avenging the defeat, at home, earlier in the season. The home side won the toss and invited the visitors to make first use of the strip. Against some very tight bowling runs were difficult to get and the batsmen had to resort to taking liberties. It was therefore with some relief, that after twenty overs, and with the score on 58 for the loss of three wickets, the rain came and washed out any further prospect of play. The two teams shared the points, but it did not help Mellor's parlous position in the league table.

One of the most unusual ships I ever sailed on was the 'Bengal Enterprise'.

When our Company chartered her, it was because she was quite small, taking only a few hundred containers, but with her own huge gantry which allowed us to both load and discharge containers without any help.

We had just started the first container service to India. AllII the normal container ships, though they could serve Mumbai, were far too big to reach Calcutta in India, and Chittagong in Bangladesh, so the large fast ships carried the containers to and from Colombo in Sri Lanka, and we connected to the other two ports.

I was serving as Chief Officer on the large 'Cardigan Bay' at the time and

was suddenly told to pack my bags and leave my ship in Singapore when we were on our way home from Japan, and take command of the 'Bengal Enterprise'.

I was quite intrigued with this, as being a bit of a romantic, I realised it was exactly what Joseph Conrad, my favourite author had

done, a hundred years earlier. So I left my ship in Singapore and flew to Colombo, where I took command of the 'Bengal Enterprise'.



thirty crew members made up of 14 different nationalities. I shall never forget an incident when we were on a very close collision course on a sharp bend in the Hooghly River. The ship was only very slowly swinging to starboard despite the wheel being hard over. And it was certainly the 'power of prayer' that made us swing clear. Of the four of us on the bridge, the Captain was Christian, the pilot was Hindu, the officer of the watch was Buddhist and the quartermaster on the wheel was Muslim, and I know we were all


praying very hard.

It was a most interesting voyage running between Colombo, Calcutta and Chittagong in Bangladesh, but it was before GPS was evolved so we still relied on the sextant and compass.

It was also very fortunate that I was able to fly my sixteen year old son



Richard out to join me on a round voyage, but little expected him to be on board when, while waiting to enter Chittagong, we were



boarded by pirates brandishing swords, which they used simply to cut and steal several mooring ropes, which were very valuable there.

He also managed to see the annual Perahera in the hills of Kandy and the elephant parade of the Buddha's Tooth.

It really was amazing to see the huge floating hay stacks in the moognly river going to Calcutta.

With the most amazing seamanship, a few crewmen manoeuvre giant hay stacks on top of tiny boats out of sight beneath the hay.

I overheard a radio VHF conversation between the Pilot cutter and a large foreign ship coming in for a pilot. The cutter told the arriving ship to come alongside him to collect his pilot. The visiting ship's captain said 'It's normal for your pilot to come alongside me to deliver the pilot'. The cutter replied 'But this is the Hooghly pilot'.

The answer came 'I don't care if you're Pontius Pilot, you should still come alongside my ship'.

As Omar Khayyam wrote



The moving finger writes, and having writ Moves on, nor all thy piety nor wit Shall lure it back to cancel half a line, Nor all thy tears wash out a word of it.

And what of 'now' which is gone as soon as we say the word. 'Now' is the gate which closes the past and opens the future. 'Now' has no duration as one moves into the future, and one cannot hurry forward to a longed-for event or linger to extend an enjoyable occasion.

Time has puzzled philosophers from the earliest years. Aristotle said 'One part of time has been and is not, while the other is going to be and is not yet.' St Augustine said 'What then is time? If no one asks me, I know; if I wish to explain it to one who asks, I know not'. And Roger Scruton wrote 'everything that we cherish or fear, everything that matters in the least to us, has either vanished forever or not yet arrived. All that we have is the infinitesimal fragment of the now, which vanishes in turn just as soon as we try to lay our hands on it'.

Time is 'the enemy' and we learn to use it as well as we can when we become aware how precious it is. A life in a timeless universe is unimaginable: if there were no time there would be no beginnings and no ends, no before or after, no memories and no looking forward.

Christians believe that there is a life after death, and hope to go to heaven for a life of eternal bliss if they have behaved well during their earthly existence, as do other religions, but we do not know if eternity has a time base or whether heaven is timeless - an eternal 'now'.

There is only one way to find out!



It is difficult to choose a **Memorable Date in September**. Peace was promised on September 30th 1938, but promises were broken, for in 1939 at 5:30am on the 1st of September Hitler's armies invaded Poland and World War II began in Europe the day after; The Anglican Church was fully established in the reign of Elizabeth 1st who was born on the 7th in 1153; Queen Eliabeth II died on the 8th in 2022-both were guardians of the C.of E; nobody will forget 9/11 2021 when the worst terrorist attack in U.S. history occurred; The Mayflower ship left England on the 16th in 1620 and finally on the 19th in 1893 New Zealand gave women the vote.

The date chosen is **September 5**, **1997** when Mother Theresa died in Calcutta at the age of 87, after a life of good works spent aiding the sick and poor in India through her Missionaries of Charity Order and especially her care for children. This prayer below is usually accredited to Mother Teresa though it was probably written by Keith Kent. It was found written on the wall of Mother Theresa's Home for Children in Calcutta. I heard it first at Janet Wilson's funeral - a dearly loved member of the Church who devoted her life to her family, her work as a teacher, to the young people in the Choir and to many Church activities. She has been sorely missed by John, his family and us all.


