

Can you eat a Christmas tree?

One of the questions asked in a Christmas quiz was, 'Can you eat a Christmas tree?' The answer is YES and you might be interested to know its uses.

- *The Plants For a Future database lists the following edible uses for the Norway spruce:
- *Young male catkins either raw or cooked can be used as a flavouring.
- *Immature female cones can be cooked. The central portion, when roasted, is sweet and syrupy.
- *The raw seed is rich in oil and with a pleasant slightly resinous flavour, but too small and fiddly to be worthwhile unless you are desperate.
- *A refreshing tea, rich in vitamin C, can be made from the young shoot tips. These tips are also used in making spruce beer.

 Food for thought but always check that you are eating the correct plant

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The 'Famous' Mellor Crib Service

Very soon after I arrived in Mellor people started asking me, 'Will there be a crib service this year?' I soon began to realise what a major event this service has been in the culture and folk memory of the community here. It seems many people date Christmases past according to who took which role that year. 'Ah yes,' they say. 'That's the year so and so was Mary, and so and so was baby Jesus.'

I had no doubt that we should continue this tradition, as long as there were helpers and a will to make it happen. The first big question was whether we should hold one shorter service (as you did last year) or be ambitious and go back to holding two services with two casts, a lot of additional work, and a well-organised turn-around between 4 and 5.30 pm. I am so glad we decided to go for the two services. The online (free) tickets were 'sold out' within a couple of days, such was

the demand. It was great to see the church full on both occasions, and to send out a clear message that 'normal' service' was resumed, after the restrictions of the pandemic.

At the first rehearsal, attendance was a bit thin. I had to step in to play the role of Joseph and another dad played Mary! One of the narrators read nicely but very quietly. She and her parents obviously went away and practised because the following



week her voice was transformed - strong and clear and expressive. That was one of many moving moments for me. If I was a bit concerned how it would go on the day, Oscar was calm and confident it would all come together - and he was right.

Each service lasted just half an hour, but that was the end result of hours and hours of work by so many people behind the scenes. Thank you to all who sorted out, cleaned and repaired the costumes; to those who organised the casting; to those who helped with the rehearsals and



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A DIY project for 2024 / Mellor Birds

Quite a few people say to me that they have large birds in their garden like jackdaws, wood pigeons, jays and magpies but no little birds which they would like to see. Well, I think I may have an answer for you.

Margaret Lowe was delivering her round of Outlook magazines along Parkside when she came across Doug fabricating or rather rebuilding/ refining his bird feeder. Doug has been determined to stop the squirrels and large birds getting to his bird feeders.

His wife Heather came up with the idea of getting the smallest dog cage you can buy from Pets at Home.

To keep the food dry he fitted a green felt roof on top. Then the sides are covered in 3mm (no less as squirrels eat it) perspex sheeting. He did not attach the perspex with cable ties as the squirrels eat them.

Doug cut at the back, a small hole 25mm sq.

No Bigger, as squirrels can get in through a 30mm hole. The feeder is perfectly sited so he can sit at the dining table and look out about two metres away at eye level into the bird feeder which is



close to a hedge looking over the lawn. There are five cylindrical bird feeders hanging inside from the cage roof with nuts and seeds. Also dishes with broken up fat balls. Now Doug watches up to four nuthatches, goldfinches, chaffinches, blue tits, great tits, coal tits, long tail tits and robins.

PICKLEBALL

What is that? I am constantly asked when I say I play it. Pickleball is a game from America, that is fast becoming very popular over here. First invented by parents in 1965 as a child's game.

It is a game that encompasses factors of tennis, badminton and table tennis, and if you like racket sports you would enjoy this.

It is played on a badminton sized court, with an airflow ball (a plastic ball with holes in it) and a paddle bat, slightly larger than a table

tennis bat. The scoring follows the 'old' badminton style of scoring, whereby a side can only win a point if they have served the ball. The net is slightly smaller than a tennis net, and the area either side of it is called the 'kitchen'.

Players stand behind the back line to serve into the opposite court, and the ball must bounce once before it can be hit back. That return also has to bounce once before being hit, from then onwards the ball can be volleyed or allowed to bounce on the return shot. But ... if you volley from behind the kitchen area, and your foot strays into that area, it's a lost shot, but if the ball bounces in the kitchen area first you can put your foot in the kitchen and play on! Are you in a pickle now? It's actually easier than it sounds, and the aim after the third shot is to go to the kitchen area and volley from there to beat your opponent, and where a lot of furious fun is had. It is not as exhausting as tennis, and is a lot of fun.

If you fancy trying it, then come along to Brinnington Leisure park, Northumberland Rd, on a Friday at 12 noon and join us. We are new group of learners and everyone is welcome.


Mellor's Got Talent 2024

First of all I was on the 385 bus when Margaret, who lives near the top of Moor End Road on the left, said on Christmas Day that the barn owl flew past her back bedroom window. What a Christmas present! Jan C saw three barn



owls near the bus terminus at Rush Lane on Dec 30th and again since then in quite murky conditions and close up at 9.30am. Then Jane C at the top of Longhurst Lane, sent a video of the owl doing a 'New Year's Day fly by' their home, over the field looking up to the Church. Then Alison and Ian D, a few doors away, on Longhurst Lane sent this great photo not only of a barn owl on a post but also a Tawny Owl roosting saying:- 'We have had the pleasure of watching a barn owl in



the field behind us over the last few weeks. It often appears around 8.00am. However, last week it was quartering the field hunting during the day. We also saw a tawny owl roosting in a tree on Mellor Rec (19/10/23 at 14:30) - it was there for a couple of days - a nice sight.' Then on Jan 5th Helen G saw the barn owl while out walking. Helen also spotted Rishi Sunak in Marple that day.

John W on Church Lane had not been seeing many birds on his feeder so bought some new feeders and instantly

saw a woodpecker and goldfinches.

Julia M has been watching a **nuthatch** at The Mellor Centre, opposite the drive, up a telegraph pole, hammering on a metal box.

David K opposite the Rec has seen five **redpolls** in his garden. He always used to have them in his garden but they disappeared last year. His ecologist son saw with a thermal camera three **woodcock** in the new tree plantation on Gibb Laneprobably over wintering here from the continent.

Rosemary H who reads Outlook at her home in Leicestershire surrounded by old woodlands and fields had a lovely surprise when two very small black and white woodpeckers came high in the tree near her door. On closer inspection they were **lesser spotted woodpeckers** she had never seen before. Lucky Rosemary.

Mellor Art Society

We are a self-help group of amateur artists who meet every Wednesday 7.30pm-9.30pm At St Martin's Church Hall, Brabyns Brow, Marple Bridge We also have speakers and workshops in many diverse and inspirational techniques.



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I little thought when I began my series of interesting memories, that I would include my year based ashore in the City of London.

It was in the very early days of containers and we were a small team of ship planners appointed by TRIO Lines, UK, Germany and Japan. The shipping companies included were Ben Line from Scotland, Overseas Containers from England, Hapag Lloyd from Germany and NYK and OSK from Japan. We little thought at the time, that this new system would change the entire global business.

Prior to containerisation, the cargo liners' cargo was planned by the ship's chief officer, who was well aware that the profit or loss on the voyage depended on the cargo planning. Due to the present Red Sea crisis we are seeing these enormous ships regularly on our TV screens. Some carry as many as 24 thousand (twenty foot equivalent) containers, and I frequently think what a skill and responsibility their planners must need.

One Friday night when I was working late in my London office, planning a ship loading in Taiwan, I received an urgent call from the manager of a circus in Germany. He had booked his circus on one of our ships sailing to the Far East. He said, "You've agreed to carry two circus staff on your ship together with all the animals, could you possibly take an extra one?" I just couldn't contact any of our management that deal with these matters so I joked, 'I've recently sailed on the ship, so I know she won't notice one extra clown, so that's OK. When Monday morning came round my phone was red hot. By giving another free passage to another circus hand it was against the Conference rules and thus considered a bribe to help secure the whole booking! And of course our Company would not stoop to such behaviour.

Anyway I managed to make up for accommodating the extra clown.

The ship I had planned was on her way home but had plenty

of space remaining due to a Far East holiday. I arranged for her to call at Jeddah to load several hundred empty containers we had waiting there. Our other partners agreed to the change of schedule but refused to load any empties so they wouldn't need to pay any of the port charges. Then, due to a dockers' strike in Southampton, it was decided to put the ship into Portbury, the new container port for Bristol. As it was a maiden call, the Bristol Newspaper displayed a perfect photograph of our ship with all the deck cargo being OCL containers. The management were specially impressed as all other photos of the ship fully loaded showed the containers of all the five companies in TRIO.

They forgot about the extra clown and thanked me for the thoughtful planning.

Pasta Flora or Greek Jam Tart

This is normally served as a large tart with a lattice topping or you can use small tins, on either if you do not want to make a lattice decorations such as hearts, stars cut with biscuit cutters will look good. I have never put alcohol in pastry so looked up to find out why it is used, it prevents the proteins bonding so moistens the dough without toughening it.

The alcohol burns off in the heat of the oven so is safe for everyone.

Glaze with beaten egg yolk, a first for me I have always used beaten egg but using only the yolk does really gild the pastry.

300g plain flour 100g caster sugar 170g butter

1 egg

2tbsp brandy (or any spirit - optional)

I used Cointreau

Zest of half an orange

400g of jam preferably I like raspberry or a

Morello cherry that is not too sweet.

Beaten egg yolk to glaze

Rub the fat into the flour until you have breadcrumbs or use a food processor.

Stir in the sugar, orange zest, then add the alcohol and egg.

Bring together and knead as little as possible until you have a ball of dough.

Refrigerate for at least 30 minutes.

Set the oven at 170C and lightly butter a 25 cm tart tin.

Cut 1/3rd of the ball of dough and put it aside for the decoration of the top.

Roll the dough to a circle to line your tin and lightly prick the base with a fork.

Spread the jam over the dough and top with either a lattice or some shapes cut with a biscuit cutter.

Bake for 25 -30 minutes.



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Discovery at Chester Cathedral.

The artwork will explore chemistry and biology and interpret artistically the scale of molecules cells and DNA as well as exploring the history of science and its contributions to humanity, while reflecting upon famous scientists past and present.

The architectural beauty of Chester Cathedral will be exposed and enhanced by the artwork projected throughout as you walk through the light artworks and installations.

The Very Revd Dr Tim Stratford, Dean of Chester says:

'I'm excited to commence 2024 with such an awe-inspiring event. Peter Walker, and the Luxmuralis team have created events in cathedrals nationally, and it's fantastic to bring one to Chester. A first for the city!' Our visitors were stunned by the 'Once a Desert' installation in the Cathedral nave in 2022, however, Discovery will be much larger, and illuminate most of the Cathedral interior. It really will be outstanding!' he concludes.

Artist Peter walker says:

'The installation allows us to look at such concepts, from the vastness of space to the smallest things ever discovered, from the uniqueness of earth to its fragility. The installation is for people of all ages to walk through a truly immersive fine art experience with almost every inch of the Cathedral bathed in light and sound, and the chance to sit on the floor and watch the universe unfold before you.'

Discovery will open on Wednesday 21 February until Saturday 24 February. Tickets are priced at £9.50 for adults and £6 for children. The event will open at 5.45pm with show times through until 8.30pm daily. Tickets are available from Chester Cathedral Website

Thank you to Sally Maltby who suggested Outlook should interview Farmer John about his Mountain Bike Track.

How long has John Thorp's family lived at Hillside farm, Cote Green Lane?

Since 1891 when Lord Howard of Glossop's estate had to sell the farm to pay death duties. Five generations of Thorps have lived at Hillside farm.

When did John start building the Mountain Bike track?

Over twenty years ago before his first son was born. It originally was used for horse events for the Peak Pony club.

What is the track made of? (there is no mud from Glossop Road all the way down to the River Etherow)

Reclaimed tarmac and limestone dust.

Which other countries has John built MBT's in?

Norway, Denmark, Portugal, Austria and the USA. During Covid a lot of Austria's hiking paths were over used by bikes and so they were shut while new hiking paths were built and the original paths were changed to Mountain Bike tracks. John built a 15km track there.

Can you get refreshments?

John's wife, Jill, as well as running the Livery runs **The Cafe**. The sausages and bacon are made from their own Tamworth pigs. Sometimes they have their own honey on sale too.

What else does he rear?

Sheep. Sometimes potatoes which have gone to The Town Street Fryer.

How old are the Mountain bikers and how much does it cost? From 7yr olds to 74yr olds. It costs £10 for a day.

I was allowed to wander around the tracks and found all the bikers from young to old very happy to talk to me about how much they liked Farmer John's track. They came from all over,,,,Whitby, Whitchurch, Ambleside. Huddersfield."


John said he has parents coming to him saying how good it is for their child's mental health. (Grunting teenagers start talking to their parents!)

Latest project?

An outlook from Mellor Sports Club...

Our little Sports Club in Mellor is a hive of activity with badminton, cricket, lacrosse and tennis played at the club. The Club House offers a warm welcome with a public bar open to all and social membership is available to non-players - we can highly recommend the Mud Dog beer! Lacrosse focus... Have you ever played lacrosse? Did you know the game originated from a tribal game played by Eastern Woodlands Native Americans and Native American people of the Great Plains in what is now the United States of America and Canada. The games could last for several days with anything between 100 -1000 players on each team. Rules were decided the night before the game including the pitch size - the goals could be up to 6 miles apart! The only rule of the game was often that the ball could not be touched with the hands. The first sticks resembled wooden spoons with no netting and balls were made out of wood or deer skin. The Great Lakes sticks were bent at one end into a 4-5 inch circle and lined with netting made of wattup (tree roots!) or deer sinew. The Iroquois and Eastern Woodland style sticks used a Ushape instead of a circle. But why? Because the game settled disputes, it kept the six nations of the Iroquois together, it toughened young warriors. It was also played for pleasure with bets often involved! Sticks were carved, blessed, treasured and men were often buried with them. I think this is probably still true for many of our lacrosse players today!

Mellor Lacrosse is approaching its centenary year in 2025 (expect lots of celebration in and around Mellor) and today the Lacrosse Club has 13 teams across Men, Women, junior boys and junior girls. Mellor Lacrosse Club is recognised nationally with players from our 'little' club representing their counties and countries regularly. If you ever fancy coming along to watch you'd receive a warm welcome with games usually played every Saturday and Sunday during the season (wrap up warm!). If you are interested in finding out more

With only three days left before copy date for Outlook and still lacking inspiration I picked up my Christmas 2021 gift from Gordon. It is subtitled 'Words of Wisdom' and it arrived hours before he went to hospital. 'Put it under the tree,' he said.

I opened the late Rabbi Jonathan Sach's book at random and found myself reading his words on Marriage:-

"We were married young. Our life had its twists and turns, its unexpected blessings and crises. Looking back, I know that whatever I have done I could not have done alone. I don't think we were unusual. For most of us life just is a long journey into the unknown. The only certainty we had was that we would be there for one another, and it was enough, more than enough. We knew that we would find strength in the unspoken presence of love, come what may."

To Rabbi Sachs the Hebrew word EMUNAH does not translate to Faith but to Faithfulness. He goes on to say, "Marriage is the single greatest source of beauty in ordinary lives - moral beauty, a song scored for two voices in complex harmony.

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


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
