Vicar's Viewpoint

They are both brilliant at what they do and their leaving will be a huge loss.

A vision for our world

On Remembrance Sunday I preached about having a vision for the future of our world, and I was asked if this might be included in Outlook. By a vision I mean a dream of how things could be better - one that we believe in, and one we are prepared to work for, fight for and make sacrifices for. After WW1, the League of Nations was formed, inspired by a vision of a world in which differences are settled by words and not warfare. There was not an impossible dream. War is not inevitable. We can choose peace. But humans often make the wrong choices and again humans have chosen war, not just in 1945 but in the all the years right up to the present day, in Ukraine, in Gaza, in Sudan, in the Democratic Republic of the Congo and many other places around the world.

It is clear we cannot achieve this vision of peace on our own. We need God's help.

God's prophet Isaiah set out God's vision for the world in this passage which dates back to the 8th century BC: 'In days to come many peoples shall turn to God, that he may teach us his ways, and they shall beat their swords into ploughshares and their spears into pruning hooks; nation shall not lift up sword against nation; neither shall they learn war any more.' (Isaiah 2.2-4). It's a beautiful image, turning the weapons of war and death into instruments of cultivation, growth and life.

In the face of human history, it is easy to become cynical, and say global lasting peace is impossible. But as Christians we are called to be idealists - for all things are possible with God. As we begin a new year, what is our vision for the world? What future do we believe in? What are we prepared to fight for? I'll finish with one of my favourite prayers:

God grant us a vision of our world
as your love would make it.

A world where the weak are protected
and none go hungry or poor.

A world where the benefits of civilised life are shared,
and everyone can enjoy them.

A world where different races and cultures
live in tolerance and mutual respect.

A world where peace is built with justice,
and justice is guided by love.

And Lord, give us the inspiration and courage to build it. Amen .

Mellor Birds

The bird I have seen and heard most recently is the robin, especially when I have moved some soil in the garden.

I find poets can help provide “added value” to our experience of birds. Norman Nicholson, the Cumbrian poet who lived all his 73 years in the small terraced shop-house in Millom where his father was a gentleman’s outfitter, wrote:-



*A robin sings, with berry eyes
And breast redder than the
dead leaves
Dangling his notes like beads,
A luminous, tinkling string....*

While I was having my hair cut in Marple Bridge, the subject came up of hiring white doves for an event. Apparently, Jane tells me, there are homing pigeons which have been bred to be white and these can be released to fly around at your wedding etc... I went to the High Peak RSPB Christmas party which had a big quiz, with a sort of bird theme. One question was, “Who first recorded Mr Tambourine Man in June 1965”? *Answer:* the American rock band the Byrds. The Marple Naturalists also had a fun Christmas quiz ... of dingbat birds. One of the drawings was of a steam train with smoke coming out of it. *Answer:* Either ‘Chough’ or ‘Puffin’. Locally I have seen a buzzard mobbed by crows over Royal Oak Farm, goosanders flying up the Goyt and now I am looking out for redwings, which have been seen on Ludworth Moor. They usually come from Scandinavia and fly over the Pennines and down the valleys. Their red armpits are not always visible but the white eye stripe is easy to see and their ‘zeep, zeep call’ is easy to identify. As I write this a song thrush has been singing its repetitive song in the Mellor War Memorial garden.



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The Wandering Chorister Newcastle Cathedral



It's a long drive to the most northerly cathedral in England. The building, dedicated in 1882, stands on a Christian site first used in 1091. It has a distinctive tower, with a 'Lantern' spire, once a landmark for ships sailing the Tyne. Hadrian's Wall lies under the cathedral churchyard, and the city streets retain the medieval pattern, except where the railway cuts straight through it.

The Cathedral is a pleasant sing, despite the incense, with a good organ. The rehearsal room is a decent size and pleasantly warm. Newcastle offers choir supporters all they need for a great weekend. Party animals must come early to enjoy the traditional Thursday Night out. The wider region of Northumbria has many attractions; you could easily spend a month here.

The cathedral restaurant is good, with lovely staff. I can't remember much about the cathedral shop. It's a long way home, so break your return journey. I recommend a half way break for fish and chips at The Wetherby Whaler.

I sang with The Northern Consort, who formed after a reorganisation within the RSCM. The members, mostly from the North East and North Yorkshire, are very friendly.

Mince Pie Tiffin

A delicious way to use up leftover mince pies, nuts, dried fruit, biscuits and chocolate from Christmas. I think it is worth buying the chocolate to make it if you have none left over. Adapted from a Waitrose recipe.

275g mince pies approximately 4 to 5 in bite size pieces. Using mincemeat preferably with alcohol in it.

70g toasted nuts or sweet plain biscuits or Maltesers.

200g chocolate your choice.

80g butter.

Optional 30g dried sour cherries or cranberries.

Melt together the chocolate and the butter gently and beat until smooth.

Add the chopped mince pies, nuts or biscuits, the cherries if using.

Pour/spoon into a lined 6inch square tin.

Transfer to the fridge to set. Cut into whatever size suits you. I made 10.

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Kinder Mountain Rescue Team



Kinder Mountain Rescue Team (KMRT) is very honoured to have been chosen by Mellor Women's Evening Fellowship as their charity of the year. KMRT receives no funding from central or local government, so relies entirely on fundraising activities, donations and grants. It costs approximately £50,000 a year to run the team on top of which significant projects have to be funded, such as the purchase, maintenance and development of KMRT's base, vehicles and extensive equipment.

Anyone can have an accident. KMRT plays a vital role providing a 999-search and rescue service, on call 24/7/365, to anyone needing help who cannot be reached by the emergency services or where the emergency services request support. KMRT is based in Hayfield, primarily operating in the High Peak and Stockport areas, including Mellor, Marple and Romiley.



KMRT searches urban and rural terrains for injured, lost or missing vulnerable people, providing remote responder medical care which is often lifesaving. KMRT also assists the emergency services with water rescues, response to bad weather and multi-agency major incident emergency responses. For example, helping rescue people stranded in their houses due to the Stockport flooding on January 1st 2025 and helping the emergency services on the partial collapse of the Whaley Bridge reservoir dam wall.



Kinder Scout is a large area which is notoriously difficult to navigate in poor conditions. Even in summer casualties can quickly develop hypothermia. KMRT helped rescue a missing hypothermic walker

struggling in deep snow on Bleaklow who otherwise could have died. KMRT also helps with unusual call outs, for example a night-time full rope rescue for a dog which had got stuck part of the way down Kinder Downfall and the rescue of a public toilet thrown into the River Goyt at the New Mills Torrs.

KMRT is kept very busy as the number of callouts increases each year. The average number of callouts used to average around 46 per year, but in 2024 there were 73 callouts and by mid-November 2025 there have already been 71 call outs. As well as responding to callouts, the team has a lot of other things to do including extensive training, vehicle checks and maintenance, co-ordinating and attending fundraising events, and finding and making grant applications. The 50+ team members are all volunteers, most of whom have jobs as well as family commitments.

An extract from *Youthful Days in Mellor 1910 to 1926*

I was born on April 26th, 1910 in an old stone cottage in Mellor which was situated about 100 yards up the road from the Devonshire Arms on the right hand or southerly side.

We seemed to get much more snow in those days; never a winter went by without some, and we always managed to do some tobogganing down "Heathcote's field", below Birchenough, our local run. Then we grew more adventurous and were tempted to try Alehouse Brow, or "Th' Ale'ns", as it was known to local people. This is the hill slope down the fields behind the Church, towards Greenhill Farm. This was a very steep, fast run which, in good conditions, would attract 100 or so tobogganers at weekends, and as many spectators. I believe I used this run on some occasions almost every winter until I was nearly 30. Once, on a night of full moon and hard frost, I went to join some friends there, and as my approach was from the top end I set off between the two walls just past the vicarage. This was well above the usual start at the top of the very steep section, and I was travelling fast when I reached this point. The surface of the steep part had consolidated into smooth, hard ice after a slight mid-day thaw, and I rattled down it in seconds, all my efforts being concentrated on hanging on. There is a sudden dip at the bottom of this steep bit where one is air-born for a yard or so, and I went over here with a shattering jolt. Then down the less steep part below with scarcely any reduction in speed, until I managed to turn off the track into deeper, soft snow, and throw myself off at the bottom of the field just above Greenhill Farm. Other snow recollections were of very deep falls. One, coming late, about early April, deposited almost two feet of snow in a single night, and in places we had to walk on the wall tops to get to school. Deep, drifting snow nearly always came on a south-east wind, and the drifts would always

form in the same places.

One of these was at the corner where the lane branches off Moor End Road up to Larkhill, and this would block the main road to traffic until it was dug through. It would form higher than a man's height, and we once tunnelled a grand snow house in it. Nearly every winter the Roman Lakes would be frozen over for some periods, and thronged with skaters, especially at week-ends.

I left Mellor School along with Norman when I was 11 to go to what was called then New Mills Secondary School. Here we found that we were little boys again, and that the big ones were as tall as men and very formidable too. We walked over to New Mills every day, leaving home about 8.30 for a 9.30 start; I think we estimated the distance to be $2\frac{3}{4}$ miles. There was quite a crowd of us - Norman and myself, Norman's eldest brother, Arthur and his friend, Norman Clough, both in the 6th form, Phil and Louis Norris from the second house in Gibb Lane, and Jim and Charlie Hambleton from the farm opposite Lower Hall gates. There were two girls, Phylis Walker from the house on the right at the top of Cheetham Hill, and Hilda Clough. Sometimes we walked together and sometimes in small groups, and however bad the weather it made no difference, we had sou-westers, good rain-coats and leggings. We were pleased when we did get wet as we were sent down to the boiler house at school to dry out, thereby missing the first lesson.

Sometimes in winter when snow lay on the ground and conditions were right, we took toboggans with us and went roaring down the hill into New Mills at astonishing speed. This tended to arouse the wrath of the good citizens of the town who developed the spoil-sport habit of scattering cinders over the icy surface. There were a number of small ponds on the tops, and after hard frosts our way to school would be planned to take in most of these for sliding on. One morning Phil Norris went through the ice up to his knees in water and thick mud, and although we cleaned him up as best we could, he still had to go to school in a very dirty condition, complaining bitterly of cold feet!

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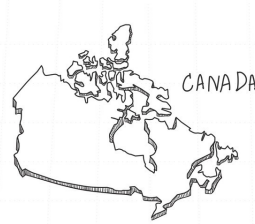
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A view of Canadian Wildlife!

Sally Maltby kindly sent us her view of Canadian wildlife on her trip to see her daughter and family in Oakville, a town west of Toronto, in Canada, for five weeks last July/August.



The weather was very hot and humid, as I was supposed to visiting for a rest, I spent quite a lot time sitting outside in the shade, watching the birds visiting my daughter's bird feeder, which hung from the branch of a tree in the fence. The garden/yard, was bordered on three sides by a deep wooded creek; it was open to a lot of wild life. Each evening before letting the dog into the garden, it had to be checked for the visiting skunk and her family, who didn't like the dog and sprayed them, hence the name! A family of rabbits had a home under the deck until the dog arrived and they left, but still visit to eat the mulberries which fall from the tree in one corner of the garden. The bird feed had to be taken in each evening because other wise it would have been destroyed by the racoons, which were very good at climbing on to the branch of the tree and then swinging on the bird feeder, until it fell to the floor, scattering the bird seed and breaking it. It was the third feeder that they had had since they moved to Canada three years ago. The very pretty humming bird feeder which I bought on an earlier visit had been smashed very quickly, as had a second one!

Now to the birds, regular visitors to the feeder were the brilliant American Chaffinch with a black head and streaked wings, as were grey Yellow Bellied Sapsucker, a woodpecker which looked very like our Lesser Spotted Woodpecker. Other regular visitors were a pair of Red Cardinals with their red crested head, Mrs Cardinal was not as brightly coloured as her husband. Black and white Juco were regular visitors, as was very pretty Morning Dove, which had long pointed tails.

Canadian Wildlife cont/

There were a lot of small grey/ blue ground feeding birds which I couldn't identify from *Birds of the Eastern America*, a book which I bought 50 years ago, when we were living in Minnisota, USA. Of course, we had regular visits from American robins, which are the size of blackbirds.

We also had visits from Blue Jays, which we had heard before we saw them, Grackles, an iridescent member of the crow family which had bright yellow eyes and a long triangular tail and a harsh call. Tiny jewelled hummingbirds visited the flowers which hung over the next door neighbour's fence. Whilst out walking the dog in a local nature reserve we saw red winged blackbirds. There were turkey vultures soaring above us on the thermals.

On a visit to a beach on Lake Ontario, we were surrounded not surprisingly by crowds of Canada Geese. Being part of the Great Lakes Shipping Way and near to shipping locks, we also saw a lot of gulls which I was unable to identify, they did look similar to our common gull, but had an orange spot on it bill. There were bank swallows skimming over the lake water too.

I do have a local sighting in Marple Bridge too, of tiny Goldcrest, which are regular visitors to the old larch tree in our garden, I usually hear them before I see them, as they flit from branch to branch while I am hanging out the washing on the line!

Church Worship

I expect that, like me, you have grown up knowing Christ's statement quoted in Matthew's Gospel in Chapter 18 verse 20, namely, "for where two or three meet together in my name, I am there among them" (Revised English Version). Until recently I had focussed on the "2 or 3" aspect of this but I am now thinking more seriously about the "meet together" part of Jesus' words. In the context of Church worship what does this mean to you? To me it means that we congregate together to worship, supporting each other as well as communicating with Christ as a group. One of the reasons why I like to worship once a month in St Thomas' Church, Mellor, even though I now live near Chester, is because it does feel as though we worship together. With diminishing congregations in many Churches it is all the more important that we maintain this feeling of togetherness and I hope we will continue to do this in Mellor.

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William Tyndale

William Tyndale was born in Gloucestershire in about 1494 and was educated at Oxford. In 1523 he moved to London to begin his work of translating the Bible into English. However, he got no support for his project so moved to Hamburg where he visited Martin Luther, then moved to Cologne where he began printing his English New Testament. The main reason for moving out of England was that translation was regarded as heresy, punishable by death. St Jerome (342-420) had translated the Hebrew and Greek writings into Latin and that translation was used for about 1000 years and is known as the Vulgate. John Wycliff (1329-1384) translated the Vulgate into Early English and Myles Coverdale (1488-1568) also translated the Vulgate into Middle English.



William Tyndale went back to the original sources in Hebrew and Greek and his translations were so accurate and so poetic that the committee formed to produce the "King James" Bible in 1611 made extensive use of Tyndale's work so that over 80% of the New Testament comes from him. For instance:- Genesis 1. 1-3
In the begynnyng God created heaven and earth becomes in King James version, *In the beginning God created the heaven and the earth*. Psalm 23 reads, *The Lorde is my shepherde I can want nothing*. In the King James version becomes, *The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want*.

He also coined a number of well-known phrases:- *Let there be light*, *The powers that be* and *The spirit is willing but the flesh is weak*. For many years he managed to evade Henry VIII's emissaries but was eventually betrayed in Antwerp in 1535, imprisoned for a year, and his body burned at the stake because of his heresy, on the 5th October 1536. Nowadays there are several different translations of the Bible, not only in English, but in hundreds of other languages, and none of them is regarded as heretical. It is a great pity that such a devout Christian, and such a brilliant translator should have been persecuted for work which lives on and is much loved.

A Report on the November PCC Meeting

The most exciting matter for Andrew to report on was that at the service on the previous day twelve young people had been admitted to be able to begin receiving Communion and a further three wished to be admitted. He was also happy to report that the vestry group had transformed into a much larger and more enthusiastic group, over a period of time, which was very good to hear. On more practical matters, quite a large crack has appeared in the outside wall, around the vestry door. We now have a new church architect, and he had visited the site, together with a structural engineer, to assess it. They had provided a report, and did not feel there is urgent or structural damage, but further investigation was needed before remedial work can be planned.

The work continues on the provision of broadband at the church and the Mellor Centre, but as yet no completely satisfactory solution has been found. There is quite a team working on this, and further work will be done.

The Mellor Centre Management Committee (MCMC) are working on planning and ordering a new kitchen for the centre, as the current one has been there since the centre opened some 25 years ago. The team had sent their plans to the PCC for agreement, and the PCC were very happy to support them.

The PCC was sad to hear that Mike and Val Wallace, the caretaker and office manager at the centre, are both planning to retire in early 2026, after proving a huge asset to the running of the Centre. It was agreed that members of the PCC will work together with the MCMC on the recruitment process to find their successors.

Andrew had now run three Communion services where both the shared chalice and 'dipping' the wafer had been offered as options. The PCC agreed that this would now be offered as a choice on a weekly basis. Andrew reported that he had also had a discussion with the new church architect about the possibility of expanding choir seating but also of finding space to provide an accessible toilet. It was agreed that a PCC meeting with the architect and then a consultation with the congregation would be a positive move in the New Year.

Planning was going ahead, as ever, for the Crib service, and the PCC were very grateful to Julia Mann and Val Wallace for taking this on.

Best wishes for Christmas and the New Year from the PCC.

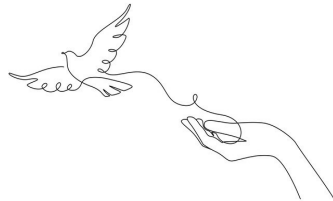
